



## JUMP WITH JILL

### Rocking Lafayette Elementary Schools

Junior League of Lafayette was proud to once again bring a nutrition education program to local schools. This past January, the world's only Rock & Roll nutrition show, **Jump with Jill**, performed over a period of five days at five elementary schools in the Lafayette area.



**Jump with Jill** takes childhood obesity by storm, serving as a kid-appropriate approach for kicking off wellness initiatives, reinforcing classroom learning and supporting a healthier cafeteria menu. The show is both educationally sound and completely rock & roll! **Jump with Jill** uses catchy songs and upbeat dance moves to get kids engaged, moving and learning about healthy habits in eating and exercise.

Junior League of Lafayette brought the **Jump with Jill**

show to five local elementary schools, January 28-February 1, 2019. The live, interactive nutrition concert was presented to a total of 3,472 students over a week-long period.

The schools visited included Ridge Elementary, Milton Elementary, Woodvale Elementary, Prairie Elementary and Cpl. Michael Middlebrook Elementary. Thank you to our **Jump with Jill** Committee for their hard work this season and for a successful series of events.

# Distracted Driving | NO FEAR NO FUTURE

Motor vehicle crashes are the number one cause of death for teens in the U.S. each year, with more than **58%** of those accidents caused by **distracted driving**. Junior League of Lafayette partners with a local high school each year to present a two-day program that exposes students to the dangers of distracted and impaired driving. This program is called **NO FEAR NO FUTURE**.



This year, **NO FEAR NO FUTURE** will be held at Ascension Episcopal School's Sugar Mill Pond campus on April 2 and 3.

On the first day of **NO FEAR NO FUTURE**, the Ascension student body, parents and teachers will gather to witness a mock car crash. Twenty-four students, with help from Junior League of Lafayette volunteers and community partners, will re-enact a realistic distracted driving accident. The next day, the student body will gather again to participate in a mock funeral held for victims of the crash. The funeral will be followed by an assembly, at which Eric Searcy, a survivor of an alcohol-related crash, will speak. A state trooper will also address the assembly.

Since it began more than 15 years ago, **NO FEAR NO FUTURE** has impacted upwards of 10,000 students. "We are fortunate

to have this program in our community," stated **NO FEAR NO FUTURE** Chair, Trisha Casanova. "This event is a life-changing experience for all involved, including not only the students who participate and the spectators who witness it, but also our committee members who coordinate the program."

## 2019 Junior League of Lafayette Kitchen Tour

Saturday, March 16, Junior League of Lafayette will host the 4th Annual Kitchen Tour. The event features a self-guided tour of six stunning kitchens and outdoor entertaining spaces in the Lafayette area. Attendees will get an exclusive look at everything from renovated residences and timeless construction, to outdoor oasis settings and classic French elegance.

Here's more information on each of the remarkable homes:

### FARMINGTON DRIVE

The home on Farmington Drive was first built in 1998 and was remodeled by the homeowners in 2017. They say they were drawn to this home because they felt the style was timeless. "It has great bones," the homeowners stated. "It just needed a little tender loving care." When remodeling, there were several key features the homeowners wanted to include. In order to expand the counter space in the kitchen, the homeowners added a second island. The home also lacked an outdoor living area, so that was added as well. Now the home is perfect for entertaining guests and features gorgeous vaulted ceilings, beams, and a fireplace located in the kitchen.

### RED ROBIN TRAIL

Red Robin Trail is a new home, built in 2018. When deciding on the style for this home, the homeowners wanted a classic, elegant look, rather than a style that was "trendy." When building, the homeowners had a list of must-have features including: top-of-the-line appliances, elegant kitchen cabinets, an island that did not house a sink or stove but simply added space, and a kitchen window overlooking the backyard. This gorgeous kitchen features all of those aspects, and many more. Now that the home is complete, the homeowner listed the large island as one of her favorite features saying, "My favorite part is when others are able to sit at the island and visit with me while cooking."

### ROSELAWN BOULEVARD

This beauty was remodeled in 2018. The homeowners loved the area of town the home was located in and chose the style of the house because its layout was a great fit for their family. When remodeling, this homeowner dreamed of gorgeous custom cabinetry, including beautiful hardware and fixtures, which she selected and designed herself. Another must-see favorite feature is the kitchen's blue tongue and groove ceiling. All of these features truly shine in the abundant natural lighting that floods the space. To achieve this airy feel, the homeowners added large windows and raised the ceilings, giving much more natural light to the space than was there before.

### BEAULLIEU DRIVE

Built in 2012, Beaulieu Drive features an open floor plan and high ceilings, which the homeowner says makes the house perfect for entertaining. When deciding on a home, the homeowners looked for one that included a large backyard, a chef's kitchen, great storage, and a pool and hot tub. All of these features and more are included in this home. Out of everything the house has to offer, the homeowners especially love their large kitchen island. "We have plenty of space to prepare food, serve appetizers, and dine." They also enjoy the open feel of the outdoor kitchen, made possible by the high porch ceilings and lack of a wall behind the grill. These features allow for a breezy feel and an overall incredibly enjoyable outdoor space.

## BELLEVUE PLANTATION ROAD

The homeowners began building the home at Bellevue Plantation Road in 2016, finally moving into the home in March 2018. "It took a lot of thought for what we wanted in our home," says the homeowner. When they started designing, the homeowner wrote down everything she wanted to include and that is where the plans for the house began. A few must-haves on her list included: a large dining area, a master bedroom away from the kitchen, a sewing room upstairs overlooking the river, and most importantly, a large kitchen featuring her beautiful red stove from Italy. This homeowner is very happy with the result, especially her kitchen. "Our kitchen is where we all hang out and do some wonderful cooking. We like to entertain, so we have both the outdoor and indoor kitchen to cook in, and they both have fabulous views of the backyard facing the river and the pool."

## ACACIA DRIVE

This lovely house was built about 50 years ago, but the homeowners were forced to remodel when the home was impacted by the 2016 flood. Though the circumstances were less than ideal, the homeowners took the opportunity to include features that they did not have before. These features include a more open space, which was achieved by removing a wall dividing the kitchen and living areas. The homeowners also wanted more counter space and larger drawers for pots and pans. One of their favorite features? A dedicated space for the coffee pot that was included in the cabinetry, which allows the coffee pot to be rolled forward when it is in use but tucked out of sight at other times. The homeowners were drawn to this home because of the open backyard and outdoor living area with lake views. Since the remodel, they say they now have a fantastic view through the window above their kitchen sink.

# COOKBOOK

## *Cookbook on Kitchen Tour*

This year, Junior League of Lafayette's Kitchen Tour will feature taste treats from our Cookbook Committee at three houses along the route. These homes will have sample recipes from all four of Junior League of Lafayette's award-winning cookbooks. Tour attendees will not only have the chance to sample these delicious recipes, but will

In celebration of *Tell Me More's* 25th anniversary, we are featuring the following taste treat recipes from *Tell Me More*, which will be available to purchase during Kitchen Tour.



### Chocolate Graham Cracker Bars

- 12 double graham crackers
- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup light brown sugar
- 1 (11 ounce) package milk chocolate chips
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Line a jelly roll or metal pan with foil. Place graham crackers on foil. Melt butter and light brown sugar. Boil 3 minutes - be sure to boil - not cook - 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Should be thick. Pour over graham crackers and spread evenly. Sprinkle milk chocolate chips (must be milk chocolate) over sugar-butter mixture and spread until even. Sprinkle pecans over melted chocolate. Cut into squares.

### Snappy Cheese Balls

- 1 jar English sharp cheese
- 1 jar jalapeno cheese
- 2 sticks butter
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon dry mustard
- Dash red pepper
- 1 cups + 4 tablespoons flour
- Stuffed olives




Blend cheeses and butter together in mixer. Season with salt, red pepper, dry mustard. Add flour gradually. Cover stuffed olive with mixture and roll into ball. Place on greased cookie sheet and chill overnight. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes. (These may be packed into freezer bags and frozen uncooked. When baking, increase temperature to 400 degrees for 12-15 minutes.)

- *Tell Me More* went from idea to print in just one year
- Nearly 70,000 copies of *Tell Me More* have been sold and the book has been reprinted three times
- *Tell Me More* was the winner of the 1994 Southern Regional Tabasco Community Cookbook Award.
- Floyd Sonnier, renowned Cajun artist, provided the illustrations found within *Tell Me More*
- *Tell Me More* was the first community cookbook that the publisher created on a computer. Before *Tell Me More*, the publisher was still creating books by hand or using a typewriter



*Tell Me More* continues to be a household favorite, and Junior League of Lafayette looks forward to many more years with this great cookbook!
